Spring is here and studio tour season is nearly upon us. From <u>Salt Spring Island Studio Tour</u> and <u>New Westminster Cultural Crawl</u>, to the <u>Lake Country Art Walk</u>, artist studio tours are a relaxing way to connect with new artists and collect the art you love.

Salt Spring's Tour is a summer-long affair, making it possible for you to watch artists while they work, following their passion. With over 25 stops on this artist-filled island, it's easy to make a weekend trip of it. You won't lack for inspiration or *food*. The largest of the gulf islands, Salt Spring is home to numerous farms which serve up freshly-baked goods, sumptuous wines and perfectly-aged cheeses. Pop over on a Saturday for the famous farmer's market, you may find yourself sampling arugula alongside Raffi, the internationally famous children's singer.

New Westminster has transformed in the past decade, with more than \$100-million in improvements, including a park that has revitalized the waterfront, which connects to the River Market by a boardwalk along the Fraser River. And with this, have come the artists. With over 50 participants, the New Westminster Cultural Crawl is one of the largest studio tours in the province. Hop the Skytrain for a short 20 minute ride from downtown Vancouver, and enjoy the new boutiques, galleries and waterfront in British Columbia's historical capital.

Lake Country ArtWalk, the largest of its kind in the BC interior, showcases original works of art and live performances created by visual and performing artists living in the Okanagan Valley. More than 300 artists of all media are exhibiting over 3000 original works of art. The event plays host to over 7000 visitors. Be sure to count yourself in this summer!
