Prince George is coined by locals as the urban centre of Northern BC, and it is home to a diverse assortment of arts and cultural experiences.

Art in Prince George takes shape in the form of festivals, musical events, theatrical productions, gallery exhibitions, studios tours, and notable historical sites. Located in an architecturally distinctive building, the **Two Rivers Gallery** is the center of visual arts in the area. In addition to hosting a variety of exhibitions throughout the year, the gallery features the MakerLab, a space to create with various tools and mediums, allowing visitors to produce their own masterpieces.



While in Prince George, be sure to watch out for upcoming festivals and events. This winter, check out the annual *Celebrate Prince George* - happening throughout the months of January and February. You'll see snow, ice sculptures, entertainment, and hopefully you will have wonderful winter experiences in places around the city like at the much loved ice slide.



Prince George has a lively performance arts scene from the locally produced music festivals *Coldsnap* (happening now), and *Heatwave* (coming summer 2018) organized by the Prince George Folk Society. From regular performances by the *Prince George Symphony Orchestra* to witnessing riveting performances at **Theatre NorthWest**, the extensive calendar of events at one the foremost playhouse's in the Northern half of the province, is worth a look.



Experience the industrial history that made Prince George the great city of Northern BC at the Railway and Forestry Museum with exhibitions and events happening throughout the year.



Indulge your cultural curiosity and explore the many historical sites surrounding Prince George. Visit *Huble Homestead* for a taste of settlement in the Pacific North West. Set up your stay in town and venture out for a days drive to the famous gold rush town of *Barkerville*, or the Husdson's Bay outpost at *Fort St. James National Historic Site*.



In addition to a dynamic settlement history, Prince George has a deep connection to the Aboriginal community. The traditions and culture of the Lheidli Tenneh people of the Carrier Nation are deeply influential. Aboriginal culture in the area draws attention to the unique experience of living at the junction of the Fraser and Nechako Rivers.



Plan your trip and experience the rich arts, cultural and historical significance of Prince George and discover the meaning of urban wilderness.

PRINCE GEORGE LOCAL EXPERIENCE AN INTERVIEW WITH ANNIE DORAN OF PRINCE GEORGE TOURISM



VDA: Prince George is a Northern city with a long history of settlement. What draws people here?

AD: The lifestyle, cost of living, a big city with all the amenities. Including excellent theatre and a vibrant arts and cultural community. It's all here, but a slower pace of living than you'd find in the valley.

VDA: What is your best memory of a uniquely PG experience?

AD: There are so many! I enjoy the proximity of outdoor recreation activities, we have a ski hill within City limits, a world class cross-country ski facility and the only inland rainforest in the world just 113km east of town

which features an accessible boardwalk. So many places to make memories.

VDA: What do you love about your community?

AD: The people - we're known for great northern hospitality and a large volunteer base.

VDA: Introduce us to a local artist.

AD: <u>Jennifer Pighin</u>. She's a local artist who designed the medals for the 2015 Canada Winter Games, she's a member of the Khstan drummers, she paints, draws, sculpts, photographs, is a local tattoo artist and creative writer.

VDA: Prince George is a multi-season destination. Tell us about what we can expect to experience in different seasons.

AD: May to September is our tourist season when most of our attractions are open. Winter lends itself to excellent outdoor activities including skating, skiing (4 ski hills), cross country, snowshoeing, hiking, the Iceman (annual winter event that includes

skiing, running, skating and swimming), Winterfest (family event downtown), and the <u>Coldsnap</u> <u>Music Festival</u> (annual mulit-day event that includes all types of music)

VDA: What is your number one recommendation for a must-do or must-see experience in Prince George?

AD: The 4 <u>Golden Raven Attractions</u> located in Prince George: Huble Homestead Historic Site, The Exploration Place, the Two Rivers Art Gallery and the Central British Columbia Railway and Forestry Museum.




VDA: Take us on a cultural walk through a PG neighbourhood (think local stops, must see public art pieces, artist studios, galleries, etc.)

AD: I love to tour the public art around the city, walking through neighbourhoods with our <u>Public</u> <u>Art Brochure</u> and spending the day taking it all in.

It's also great to take a guided tour. The Public Library runs <u>public tours</u> in the summer to take visitors around the downtown core talking about the history of the buildings and the characters that inhabited them.

VDA: Each community has a unique cultural footprint. What is the essence of what makes Prince George a distinctive cultural destination?

Our community was built on the railway and pioneering, but we also have a strong First Nation history and a deep connection to the rivers and their transportation corridors. It is fascinating to spend time reading about the area's <u>History</u>.
