Irving House

Located in the heart of the Royal City, Irving House is one of the oldest community heritage sites in BC. Step back to the 1800s as you enter the colonial home of Captain William Irving, King of the Fraser River.

Over 140 years of memories live within Irving House "...the handsomest, the best and most home-like house of which British Columbia can yet boast..." was how Irving House was described in the *British Columbian* newspaper in April 1865.

With 14 furnished rooms to enjoy, Irving House is a must-see for everyone interested in New



Museum of Northern BC

Enter the Museum of Northern BC in Prince Rupert and experience the beauty of Northwest Coast architecture and the rich traditions of the Tsimshian First Nation. Located overlooking Prince Rupert Harbour, the Museum is renowned for its spectacular collection of timeless art, that brings to life the history and culture of the Northwest Coast. The Museum also features the dramatic history of the more recent period, the fur trade, the construction of the railway, and the fishing industry. Visit the Museum's gift shop which offers Northwest Coast art in argillite, wood, silver and gold and explore the extensive selection of books highlighting the natural and cultural

Westminster's past and anyone interested in the Victorian and Edwardian periods, heritage architecture or colonial BC.



Telkwa Museum

Take a step back in time to Telkwa's early years when you visit the Telkwa Museum. Housed in a 1920's era schoolhouse, visitors will find a plethora of displays and exhibits that detail Telkwa's early years, both before and after it officially became a town.

Guests will learn about early First Nations people who first populated the region as well as interesting and eclectic facts, such as the story behind the creation of the first egg carton and its connection to Telkwa.

The Telkwa Museum is society owned-and-operated and is staffed almost entirely by volunteers who have a passion for history and who love the community. The Telkwa Museum is open from May to September and by appointment throughout the rest of the year. The museum is wheelchair accessible and child-friendly.

Museum of Surrey

Located on the Heritage Campus in Cloverdale, the museum includes a main building with feature gallery, TD Explore Zone, Indigenous Hall, Textile Centre and Surrey Stories Gallery.

Three heritage buildings are located on the east side of the museum – 1881 Town Hall, Anniedale School (1891) and the 1872 Anderson Cabin. Included on the Heritage Campus is the Surrey Archives and Cloverdale Library with Veterans Square situated on a plaza at the centre.

Their mission is to ignite young imaginations and connect Surrey's diverse citizens and communities. They contribute to community life by celebrating Surrey's past, present and future through innovative, dynamic and delightful learning, storytelling, and creating shared experiences.

Exhibits are offered throughout the year that focus on the people of Surrey, community partners, current affairs and fun, interactive learning. Exhibitions and programs always relate to the residents of Surrey with subject matter that includes Indigenous learning, immigration, Surrey's diverse communities, and sustainability.

The West Coast Railway
Association is a historical group
dedicated to the preservation of the
railway history of British Columbia.
They operate the Railway Museum of
British Columbia.

Membership is open to all people with an interest in railways past and present.

The West Coast Railway
Association presents the story of how
the railways were a catalyst in the
creation of Western Canadian
communities and their economies.
This is done primarily at the Railway
Museum of British Columbia (formerly
the West Coast Railway Heritage
Park) in Squamish, BC, where the
collection of 95 heritage railway
locomotives and cars are exhibited in
a typical small community setting.


